Elder Council Meeting Minutes

March 7, 2026

Chair, Marie Kuykendall, called the meeting to order at 10:20 am. Present were Mona Ingerson, Faith Smith, Leslie Ramczyk, Lorraine Smith, Dan Sullivan, Vera Homeskye, Clara Jalowitz and Rick St. Germaine.

### **Announcements:**

- Elders who attended the GLNAEA meeting in Mole Lake had praise for the new bus driver who assisted with baggage, drove well on icy roads and was very accommodating to the travelers. The next meeting is planned for June 3-4 in Menominee.
- The LCO Schools will celebrate its 50th anniversary at a dinner to be held on March 18th at the Convention Center, 5pm.
- "Coffee with a Cop" is a new program being offered at the Elder Center, giving elders a chance to share any safety concerns with LCO police officers.
- The Indian Child Welfare Association is sponsoring a free movie at the theatre in Hayward, April 18th, 10am.
- Storytelling will take place on March 11th, 5 to 8pm at the LCO Ojibwe University dormitory.
- The Elder Association will host a rummage sale March 14 and 15, 10am to 4pm in the space between Koobies and the Credit Union.
- The Health Board will meet March 17th at 2:30. It is an open meeting.
- On Friday, March 13th, there will be a Forum sponsored by the Sawyer County/LCO Democratic Party for candidates running for public office.
- The lights at the Quick Stop are on 24 hours a day, a waste of electricity.

### **TGB Monitors Report:**

- LCO was represented at the State of the Tribes function in Madison.
- There was discussion of planning for the membership meeting. Live streaming the membership meeting was suggested but opposed by one of the TGB members.
- JOM policies need to be approved. Amanda Shiel works at the Hayward and Winter Public Schools. Those schools receive funds from IMPACT AID to offset the lack of property tax revenue from tribal lands.
- Rosie Gonzalez is the new rice Chief and Mike DeMain is the alternate.
- NATOW, the Native American Tourism of Wisconsin, needs a representative to replace Randy Cadotte.
- The Tribe is leasing 79.07 acres to the tribal university at no cost.
- The Tribe leases property to individual tribal members. The leases need to request designation of heirs if the lessor passes.
- Do we need a probate court?
- There should be a facility to maintain important documents such as wills.
- We are hoping for a report to be circulated documenting the information provided at the Membership Meeting.

### **Elder Center:**

- Currently 160 meals are delivered every day. The cost per meal is estimated to be \$6.
- Ron Gokey and Junior Dephanais deliver meals and do wellness checks when dropping off meals.
- Angie, nutritionist and dementia specialist, is working to improve the quality of meals and designing programs to prevent isolation.
- One of their donors is donating pies.
- The Elder Center needs a greeter at the front door to assist every person who comes to the center. It is possible that funds will soon be available for this position from the DHS.
- There has been a problem at the fourplexes adjacent to the Elder Center. They have no dumpsters for their garbage.
- The agreement to provide long-term care services needs to be reviewed by the legal department.
- The Elder Center is looking for a repository for wills.

The meeting adjourned at 12:30pm.

By the time this issue is published, we will have had our Forum V, the main topic was criteria for being a member of LCO. At the end of each of our forums, we take a Bean Poll. Each participant takes a bean and votes for the type of membership criteria they prefer. They can choose Lineal, Lineal plus blood quantum (what we have now), 100% blood quantum, or Other. The results of the poll were 100% lineal. Rick reviewed how we got to this point going back to when the clan headmen would meet and what happened when the IRA was put into law. Feedback was very helpful; one of the suggestions was explore more ways to get the information to more people. The next forum may test some more ways to communicate. We will be working on the topic of Sovereignty, Mail-in ballots, among other items. The date is not set for the next forum, it depends on how much or quickly we can research.

**Drivers and Deliveries – Just a reminder that it is our policy for the Home Delivered Meal program any owners must have their dogs tied up or in their homes so they do not go after our delivery staff. All meal recipients must be home to get their meals or appoint someone to**

be there for them. It is against policy to leave meals in a cooler, due to food safety guidelines. Our delivery staff are true heroes and alert us when an elder is in need of help or something is concerning. We appreciate all they do every day.

**Hunger Task Force Stock Box Program** – the Stock Box program is still not able to take new clients but we can still issue to people who have picked theirs up in the past two months (Feb/March). Otherwise we can put you on the “wait list”. The program is for elders 60 years of age and over who meet the financial guidelines.

**Ganawenindiwag Gathering** – “They take care of each other – gathering” is the third Wednesday of each month from 5pm-6pm. Come share a meal and get in the drawing for a door prize!

### **Walking With Our Gichi-ayaa’aaag**

Boozhoo! In many of our families, caring for our Elders is an important responsibility and a way we show respect and love. When memory changes begin, it can sometimes feel confusing or overwhelming. This column is here to share helpful information and gentle guidance to support caregivers and families in our community.

This month’s helpful information is on keeping the home safe for people living with dementia. People with Alzheimer’s or dementia may have trouble knowing what is dangerous or making safe decisions. By helping him or her feel more relaxed and less confused at home, you can help stop accidents.

People with Alzheimer’s or dementia might trip because of changes in balance or trouble walking, have problems seeing clearly due to poor eyesight, forget to turn off water, burners, or ovens, forget how to use knives, etc. or where to safely place burning objects.

#### **WHAT CAN YOU DO?**

- Keep things simple – rooms are neat and “often used” items in the same place.
- Look at the floor – remove rugs, keep things off the floor, and keep floors dry.
- Remove dangerous items – keep sharp objects and medications locked away, take off knobs on the oven and stove, and move cleaning supplies out of harm’s way.
- Don’t leave him or her alone – near running water, heating appliances, near an open door or gate, or anywhere with burning cigarettes, pipes, etc.

Our Elders carry our stories and teachings. When we care for them, we honor those gifts. If you need support or have questions about dementia care, I am here to help. ### **Health Advisory Board Meeting**

#### **Minutes**

**Date:** 3/17/26      **Time:** 2:30 pm      **Location:** Health Center Conference Room

#### **I. GLP-1 Receptor Agonist Stewardship**

The GLP-1 Receptor Agonist Stewardship Policy was discussed by pharmacist David Axt. The cost of GLP-1 medications and strategies to improve insurance coverage were reviewed. The purpose of the policy is to document efforts to support insurance approval for these medications.

Section E was discussed, including a requirement of a 5% weight loss after six months for continuation of therapy. It was noted that this is a common insurance requirement.

A motion was made to approve the policy with two revisions:

- In Section E, “will” will be changed to “may.”
- In Section B, “in” will be corrected to “if.”

Motion made by Dotty, seconded by Mona. Motion carried 5-0-0.

#### **II. Harassment Policy**

The Harassment Policy was discussed with legal representative Sanjuanita Revoy Lopez and outside HR specialist Martina. Outside counsel recommended the following revisions:

- Include a comprehensive list of protected classes and definitions
- Designate a staff member under Section 2.b. (HR was recommended, as they are typically trained in handling harassment investigations)
- Clarify the reporting hierarchy for higher-level cases
- Remove the “committee of three” referenced in Section F
- Remove Section 4 (Monitoring and Evaluation)

The policy was tabled until the next meeting. Martina and Sanjuanita will provide an updated version prior to that time.

#### **III. Tribal Sponsorship of Medicare part B and Part D Premiums**

Proposed changes to the Tribal Sponsorship of Medicare Part B and Part D Premiums Policy were discussed. Burnett County should not have been included, as it falls outside the PRC 2 service area. One patient currently residing in Burnett County will be grandfathered in due to

this error. A motion was made to approve the updated policy. Motion made by Mona, seconded by Marie. Motion carried 5-0-0.

**IV. PRC Policy and Procedures Manual**

Discussion of the PRC Policy and Procedures Manual was tabled due to pending revisions. PRC will resubmit the updated manual at a future meeting.

**V. Compliance Proposal**

A grant from the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and Indian Health Service (IHS) was awarded three years ago in the amount of \$85,000 to address compliance deficiencies. An initial assessment was completed at that time; however, updated OIG guidance for tribal health centers has since been released.

The previous contract with Native American Healthcare Group LLC was terminated for unspecified reasons. The grant funds remain unused and are set to expire in May 2026. The grant will cover the initial phase of a new contract; additional third-party funds will be required to complete the remaining work. The proposed contract will include compliance training for both the Health Advisory Board and Tribal Governing Board. Mariah will distribute the previous assessment to HAB members and has requested feedback by Friday, the 20th. She is seeking support from the HAB to proceed with utilizing the grant funds.

**VI. Other**

Discussion was held regarding tribal patients residing in nursing homes. It was suggested that the health center publish a Facebook post encouraging family members to contact Amanda Hudson if their relative is in a nursing home, in order to help identify available
